Our Guiding Philosophy

Welcome to The Omega Project

If you're serious about joining the Omega Project, it's important for you to know who we are and how we do things. Make sure you read and understand the first section of this application. Feel free to ask us any questions you may have. We are glad to arrange a meeting, either in person or over the phone, to address any questions you have about what we're doing and how it works. We want to ensure that you have all the information you need to make an informed commitment to your recovery.

Our basic philosophy differs from that of most programs. We will expect you to do more than just follow a set of rules. We invest a significant amount of time, energy, and money into those who enter the Omega Project. We will provide you with the tools to help you grow and improve, but you must desire growth and be willing to put in the effort for those tools to be effective.

Those seeking only a short-term solution to legal issues or to restore a relationship with another person will be uncomfortable in our program. Those who simply want a roof over their heads will not find what we are asking to be comfortable or even workable. If you believe that you are basically "on track" and that you do not require significant change from within, you are unlikely to be willing to live the more open and accountable lifestyle that we will ask you to live.

Those who are serious about personal growth and long-term transformation will find our program both challenging and rewarding. To see long-term change in your life, you must be willing to embrace our approach to recovery as a positive path. A true and complete lifestyle change requires a change from within. This rebuilding of a person's past and present is what we call "heart change."

We have some basic rules that are similar to those found in most recovery programs, but rules alone will not change people. Addicts, in general, require structure and accountability to get better. To be in our program, you must be willing to be tested for substances and questioned about what you are doing, where you are going, and who you are with. Neither punishment nor consistent structure are sufficient to bring about heart change. More than obedience to a basic set of rules, it is willingness that is a requirement for residents to remain with the program.

Frequently Asked Questions

I don't know you, so how can I trust you?

If a person trusts unhealthy people, it will have bad outcomes. The program is not asking residents to trust all people, but to identify those who are trustworthy and to move toward a more open lifestyle with those people. Those who do not see their need to connect with God and others in a transparent lifestyle are not a good fit for the Omega Project.

We understand that coming into the program, there will be a "testing" time to allow the new person to see if we are competent in what we are doing and to examine what we teach. Trust is a process. As trust grows, participants begin the healing process and learn to transform negative behaviors into positive responses. We have an established history of helping people, we believe we can and will demonstrate that we are effective with those who are willing to trust the process.

We believe that the number one place of trust is with God, as defined by the Bible (of the Christian faith). The second key place of trust is with godly people. We believe that heart transformation requires listening—the deep kind of listening that translates to true follow-through and not just a token going along with what is asked.

As a person grows in trust, he will be willing to walk in deeper accountability with more and more transparency. We expect openness and accountability to grow as a result of being in the program. Those who do not believe that this more open approach is needed or helpful will see what we do as intrusive and overbearing. The goal of those in the program should not be to grow out of accountability but to grow into the kind of lifestyle where it is much easier to be open and transparent.

I'm not a Christian. Will you still admit me to the program?

We do not require a specific belief or commitment to Christ from those coming into the program but we do ask for willingness to abide by our faith-based behavior standards. We also ask that residents be willing to honestly consider the faith message presented. Our program is completely faith-based, with principles taught generally coming straight from Scripture and not just stated as truth principles. Bible study and church are required parts of our program. We encourage participants to become completely accountable to biblical standards.

After a time of getting to know what is taught, if a person finds that he is not in agreement with or can no longer cooperate with the teachings of the program, we ask that he voluntarily remove himself rather than bringing a negative influence on others who do desire to pursue a way of faith and the lifestyle transformation that genuine faith brings.

Is this a cult?

Certainly not. Cults work at controlling people's behavior through manipulation and intimidation. Cults use deception and shame to control people. That is the opposite of heart change. We try to give people the space they need to decide if what we are doing is healthy and helpful. We do our best to define who we are openly. There are no tricks and no attempts to deceive. If you are willing to grow with us, we are here. No one is locked down, all are free to voluntarily leave the program at any time.

Cults also isolate members from their outside relationships. We believe marriage and family are gifts from God for our support, strengthening, and growth. There are situations in which separation, if only temporarily, is advisable. Those who are codependents, for example, will need to be willing to cut off unhealthy relationships that are harmful to their recovery. Again, the program is designed to approach each person as an individual and to bring to that person what is needed for him or her to get better.

Willingness

Our Number One Requirement: Willingness

The willingness to do whatever it takes to get better is our number one requirement for admission and for continued participation.

Willingness to be Accountable

Willingness is demonstrated and measured first through practicing accountability with leadership and each other in three areas: time, relationships, and finances.

Accountable with Time

Every new resident has an introductory phase. This phase will last for a minimum of thirty days. The introductory phase will continue until Starter Pack classes and materials are completed. During the introductory phase, permission to leave the house must be requested for and given in advance. This is not to eliminate any movement but to foster communication and accountability between the leader and the participant. Information should be volunteered, and questions willingly answered, about whether the activity is both safe and smart.

No matter how long a person has been in the program, he or she is still fully accountable for his or her time. Residents who no longer need to "ask permission" must still use the house sign-out board to communicate where they are and what they are doing to the entire household. Regardless of the length of time in the program, overnight stays will require permission from either the house supervisor or the program director.

Accountable with Relationships

For those who are a part of the program, it is our business to know who the participants spend their time with. If a person does not want this level of accountability, he shouldn't join the program or continue to participate in it. We want to ensure all relationships are healthy and helpful. Relationship connections will be restricted or eliminated as needed. See Relationship Guidelines for details regarding romantic relationships.

Accountable with Finances

Each participant is required to work together with house leaders and the budget manager to develop and keep a budget that reflects responsible use of finances. Budgets will consider each resident individually. The resident will be given more freedom to manage their own finances once all fees, fines, and other bills are paid consistently. This approach aims to promote financial independence and empower the resident to make informed decisions regarding their money which will build a stronger foundation for life. Learning to be a good steward of what we receive is an integral part of heart change. See Program Fee Policy for more details.

Hundreds of volunteer hours and thousands of dollars in community funds are invested in participants, and we want to invest time and money in those who will value that investment by demonstrating trust through a willingness to be accountable. Participants who consistently refuse to be accountable in any of these three areas will be asked to leave the program.

Willingness to Participate

At each phase of the program, there are requirements for class attendance and program participation. Those who do not meet those requirements will be subject to corrective procedures. This kind of distancing will be interpreted as an unwillingness to be accountable and could be grounds for removal.

Willingness to Live the "One Another Lifestyle"

We believe that those who pursue heart change will need to move from a very self-centered life to one that is more focused on the will of God for their lives. We expect people to be considerate of others and to work more in a community environment for the good of the entire group and not be totally focused on themselves. We also require hours of volunteering in the community as a part of this process of learning to transition away from the selfish lifestyle that is common among addicts

Behavioral Standards

While every member is regarded as an individual, there are minimal behavioral standards that apply to members of all houses. These are designed to facilitate and support a safe living environment for everyone in the program. Violations of these behavioral standards represent an unwillingness to change in the way needed to stay in the program and are grounds for corrective procedures, including removal:

- **Substance Use** - To be under the influence of alcohol, illegal drugs, or pharmaceutical medication not prescribed for you by a physician. Possession of alcohol, illegal drugs, or pharmaceutical medication not prescribed for you by a physician; taking of prescribed medicine in a manner beyond what is prescribed; or refusing to be monitored when taking medication. Failure to submit to sobriety testing whenever it is requested of you.
- **Violence** - Threats of any kind: verbal or physical, acts of violence, fighting and destruction of other participants' property, or being in another person's private areas. Possession of any kind of weapon, including guns or knives (without specific approval). Destruction or altering the physical premises, structure, facilities, and furniture.
- **Dishonesty/Rebellion** - Stealing or any activities deemed criminal in nature. Argumentative or rebellious behavior, especially when that includes refusing to follow direct requests from leadership. Lying (which includes deliberate omission of information). Being unaccountable for time, dishonesty in reporting whereabouts, or missing curfew.
- **Cleanliness** - All participants must perform housekeeping duties in their personal space as well as shared areas (kitchen, bathrooms, living room, yard, and so on). House leader or house supervisor rotates assignments and covers them at house meetings. Rooms will be inspected weekly. A clean room is one in which the bed is made, all items on the floor are picked up, and there is no accumulation of food, trash, or dirt in the room.
- **Curfews** - Sunday through Thursday, curfew is 10:00 p.m., and on Friday and Saturday nights, it is midnight. Participants should not leave the premises before 6:00 a.m. unless otherwise authorized. Your house leader must approve curfew extensions.
 - Everyone who enters the program has an introductory period for a minimum of 30 days, during which their curfew is one hour earlier than the times listed. After the introductory period, the curfew will be extended to the regular times.
- **Overnight stays** - Overnight passes must be requested in writing and are approved on a case-by-case basis. Prayerful consideration is given to what is safe for the participant and what might distract the participant from focusing on what is required for recovery. Passes will be granted at the house leader's discretion and are not a "right" of the participant, regardless of marital status. Because of the program's Christian standards, no overnight stays of a potentially romantic or sexual nature will be granted to those who are not married.
- **Meeting Attendance** - All house members are expected to participate in program activities regardless of their time in the program. Depending on their stage of recovery and spiritual maturity, newer participants will be required to attend more group meetings and/or more individual study and devotion time. Unauthorized tardiness or absence from any required activities may result in community service hours or other disciplinary measures. Continued absence will be interpreted as a lack of willingness and interest in the program, prompting a discussion about removal.
- **Media** - Music, television, video, and reading materials, as well as mobile phone, internet, and computer use, must all be of a healthy and wholesome nature. We share outcomes. Engaging in inappropriate or explicit content blocks connection with God and is harmful to both the individual and the house. Failure to comply with this rule may result in corrective action.
- **Visitors** - Visitors are not allowed in the house's personal spaces (bedrooms) unless prior permission is granted by the house supervisor or the program director.

Behavioral Standards, cont'd

- Medication – All prescription medications must be disclosed in advance, and a handling plan must be in place before any individual is accepted into the program. Any medication prescribed during residency must also be reported to house leadership. Any participant who fails to notify the leadership of all prescribed medication or who does not have a handling plan may be removed.
- Mail & deliveries – Any suspicious mail, packages, or deliveries may be examined and opened by the house leader or house supervisor.
- Smoking – Smoking is not allowed inside the house or in ministry vehicles. Vaping is also discouraged. Outside of the house, smoking is permitted in smoking areas. A fine and/or community service will be imposed for any violation of this rule.
- Herbal products – Any use or possession of kratom and cannabis-derived products, including legal products such as Delta-8, is prohibited. Because of the ambiguity with drug testing, CBD is also not allowed.
- Pets – Residents may not bring pets into the program. This also applies to service animals. With the number of requests we get for pets and service animals, we would be overrun with multiple pets in each house. Visitation with service animals can be arranged. This is a privilege, not a right. Details and arrangements must be made in advance at the house meeting. Visitation and details must be agreed upon by the house.

Procedure for Correction

Violations of these standards are highly damaging to the program as a whole, and for a person to remain in the program, there must be a reasonable plan to help ensure that these behaviors do not happen again.

We give people a chance to grow into what is required, but trust, openness, and honesty must be present, or our attempt to offer those who violate rules a "second chance" will end in failure. We believe in and strive to practice the "one-another lifestyle," which means that leaders and followers are held to the same kinds of standards. This fosters a culture of trust, transparency, accountability, and integrity within our community.

Our first step is to inform the individual and their house leaders of issues and concerns, verbally asking for needed changes and discussing steps for correction.

Our second step is to make a probationary plan that includes boundaries and consequences for previous and future actions to motivate and support change. This probation plan will be detailed in writing and shared with all house leaders and members.

Our final step is removal from the program.

To ensure a harmonious and accountable community, we encourage open and honest communication to address any issues or conflicts that may arise. The primary place of accountability for a participant is to the house, the house leader, and the house supervisor, then to the program director and leadership team, and finally to the Live Free Board if there is a concern that needs to be brought to that level.

Whenever possible, we will try to restore those who are breaking rules and help them make positive changes in their lives. However, if the person is unwilling or unable to change their behaviors, it may be necessary to terminate their participation in the program.

Probation & House Arrest

If the leadership team agrees that the person can be restored without endangering others, we will attempt to intervene in the person's life to bring about positive change.

Through the probation plan, the leadership team will evaluate the attitude and responses of the person to see if they seem to be willing to do what is needed to change the problematic behavior or attitude. Depending on the initial response of the person, removal could happen immediately or could be delayed for a period to observe whether there seems to be sufficient willingness to change. Every probation plan is personalized case by case, with the individual's needs for growth in mind. The probationary plan will set boundaries and growth steps, that could include, but are not limited to:

- Restricted phone access, which can range from turning it in at night to not having access to any electronics. The goal is to keep distractions away from what the person needs to do to grow.
- Limited ability to drive, to connect with certain people, or to go anywhere with people who are potentially a bad influence.
- In cases where the temptation level is dangerous, we do occasionally ask that a person relinquish their identification, car keys, and/or money as a condition of remaining in the program.
- Additional community service hours, study time, mentoring connections, or some kind of activity to fill out the person's schedule in a positive way. This could even include journaling or prayer time.
- Participants subject to removal must be willing to be on what we call "house arrest." This means that they go nowhere away from the house without specific permission. Anytime a person under house arrest needs to leave the house, except in very rare circumstances and with prior approval, they must be with an authorized accountability partner.

Moving Out

Whether a resident moves out through disciplinary removal or voluntarily leaves, belongings must be removed promptly.

Arrangements to move out must be scheduled so that house leadership can be present to oversee packing and moving out.

If an agreement is made with a house leader, possessions are typically stored no longer than a week after a person leaves the program. If there is no move-out plan made with leadership, all belongings left on program premises for more than 48 hours will be packed up under the supervision of house leadership. From there, items left on the premises will be handled at the program director's discretion. They may be donated to Save and Share, disposed, or made available to others in need.

If the participant has worked with Omega Work Force, LLC., we reserve the right to withhold the final paycheck up to, but not more than, any amount owed to Live Free Ministries.

Program Fee Policy

We do not want the inability to pay to block anyone from coming into the program, but we do require that everyone learn to communicate and be accountable with us in the financial area.

The program fees paid by participants cover only a portion of the costs; the rest is donated by the community. The Omega Project is unwilling to raise funds to cover frivolous spending or laziness on the part of participants who do not work or manage their finances. Participants are assisted and encouraged to transition from an entitlement mentality in which life is about what can be obtained from the government and other places of charity to one in which they are responsible for themselves, giving to others, and nurturing others.

During the initial intake appointment, you'll schedule an appointment with the budget manager. To prepare for this meeting, fill out the Fresh Start Worksheet in your Starter Pack. Bring the worksheet and any documentation you have of criminal or civil fines, child support, the cost of prescription medications, vehicle payment(s), insurance costs, and any outstanding loans or monies owed. If employed, the name of your employer, the payday schedule, and the rate of pay.

Based on this information, the budget manager will work to come to an agreed amount for an individualized program fee based on a sliding scale. Program fees are set expenses based on the cost of living in our houses. This includes housing, utilities, water, phone, internet, trash collection, and your class materials. The current charge is \$105 per week. For those who can pay upfront, \$450 a month. Everyone should be willing to do their fair share to keep the program funded according to their ability to help out.

If a person has a sudden change (loss of job, etc.) and is not able to complete the terms of the program fee that were agreed upon, it is his or her responsibility to communicate immediately with the budget manager. This communication is required in order for program fees to be adjusted accordingly.

Any time residents receive funds from any source (an employer, side work, income tax refund, government benefits, gifts, etc.), it must be recorded on an Omega budget sheet. The budget sheet must be signed by the house leader and turned into the Omega Project office within 24 hours of receiving any monies.

This encourages residents to develop financial responsibility and accountability, resulting in a more stable and secure future. Anyone not paying agreed program fee, reporting and budgeting all income, and/or not meeting with the budget manager will be given a verbal warning, then a written warning, and then face removal.

Relationship Guidelines

Romantic or sexual relationships done wrong will cause very bad life outcomes and will likely lead an addict back into a using lifestyle. Those who date too soon will almost always choose someone who is at their current level of sobriety or health. That is risky!

*These guidelines differ for those who are married when entering the program. They will have unique challenges and considerations to navigate in their recovery journey.

**Time frames are not absolute but are a guideline for establishing a strong foundation, first in recovery and then in a relationship.

Stage 1: Gaining Value (0-6 Months in Program)**

For those who come into the program without a significant relationship commitment, there should be no pursuit of a romantic or sexual relationship for the first 6-12 months.

During that time, residents must learn to receive value from a variety of sources. Value must come from God and from a circle of people for a person to be ready for a more serious relationship. A person is not ready to be married until he or she is ready to be single for the rest of his or her life. Once you are okay with you, you have a much better chance of having a healthy relationship and marriage.

*Married guidelines (0-3 Months in Program): Generally, there should be no intimate connecting in the first 3 months. Any communication or connection will need prior approval from the program director. After the initial 3 months, however, communication and time together should be shared with leadership and housemates for accountability purposes.

Stage 2: Friendship (6-12 Months in Program)**

With addicts, once there is a "pairing up," the nature of the relationship changes in unhealthy ways. There needs to be an extended period of friendship before anything romantic is allowed to grow! This period of friendship allows both individuals to truly understand and appreciate each other's values, goals, and personalities. The person who rushes through the friendship stage will not be capable of a quality romantic relationship. They may overlook important aspects and fail to establish a strong foundation.

For those not married before coming into the program, six months of continuous sobriety, demonstrated willingness, and program participation are required before any "friendship" time is approved. When there is a desire to pursue friendship, there needs to be a sit-down interview first with the program director. Generally, only supervised or public time (group activities) will be approved unless or until a clear pattern of trust is established.

Rules for Friendship Relationships:

- 1.No physical contact.
- 2.No romantic language... (Various forms of "I love you." Even when it is meant to be friendship, it has the probability of being heard differently.)
- 3.No commitment language. (i.e., "I'm yours forever!")
- 4.No words or actions of jealousy, ownership, or exclusivity.
- 5.No sexual language.

If any of the rules above are violated, there will be a temporary suspension of any time together. Repeated violations would mean the elimination of approved relationship time.

Relationship Guidelines, cont'd

Stage3: Dating (12 Months in Program)**

Those wanting to "date," in the more traditional sense, will need to fulfill 6 months of the "friendship" rules before considering making a more significant commitment to one another and thus moving to more freedom in relationship language and activity. Those desiring to move into a dating relationship will need to visit with the program director to establish proper boundaries for a dating relationship.

Dating relationships will only be allowed for those who are in a place where both the man and woman are healthy enough to pursue a serious relationship. The man and woman will also need to have a plan for financial independence, handling children, and other practical issues. Both the man and the woman should be able to give a reasonable indication that they have sought out the direction of God and that they are ready to explore whether or not marriage is His will for their future.

Total Accountability

Those wanting to spend time together will need to get approval for each activity from the program director with input from his or her house leader(s). Requests must be approved ahead of time. A text should be sent to the house leader and the program director at the beginning point and at the endpoint of the connection time.

Frequency of Contact

Unless it is a married couple working toward being back in the same house, visits will be limited to two times a week. This includes phone calls if they last more than 15 minutes on a given night or texts if they become excessive. Especially in the early stages, romantic relationships can become exclusive and isolated from support people. This is dangerous. A healthy relationship is in addition to, not in place of, a healthy and balanced life. Participants need to maintain the priority of relationships with a circle of people.

Open Communication

Texts, emails, and direct messages should be open for review by the leadership team. If you don't want it to be seen or if it doesn't fit the rules listed, don't write it. Any communication (phone, text, email, etc.) between potential partners will be considered open for oversight by leadership. This policy is in place to ensure accountability and maintain a safe recovery environment within the program.

Children's Policy

Having children visit at an Omega Project home is a privilege, not a right. Visits will only be allowed when it is safe for the child and will not negatively impact the house as a whole. Violations of this policy or inadequate supervision during child visits will result in the loss of visitation privileges.

- All visits must be approved in advance by a House Leader using the Children's Visit Request Form, blank forms are kept in the office hall and in the house leader's book.
- The request should not create any significant liability to the program or members of the house (i.e., custody conflicts, runaways, illegal activity, etc.).
- Visits are limited to residents' children, grandchildren, or close relatives of current house residents. Visits or childcare for unrelated children must be discussed and approved by the leadership team at a leaders' meeting with the requesting Omega resident present.
- Parents/guardians are responsible for having a supervision plan for their children before they're allowed to visit. Children should not be left in the general care of the house, nor should they be unsupervised at any time. Until a resident has a plan for continuous supervision, no visit will be approved.
- No children are allowed at morning meetings or evening classes. Children may attend House Church and special gatherings, provided they are not disruptive. Prior approval is recommended.

Transportation Policy

Every individual is responsible for arranging transportation to their jobs, classes, errands, etc. Access to transportation is a privilege not a right.

This policy applies to individuals who have accepted the role of house driver or program driver, whether using their personal vehicle or a program vehicle. Program vehicles are sometimes donated to Omega Project. The Program Director determines where those donations can be best utilized.

Reasons for Policy:

1. To recoup a portion of increasing fuel costs that is not funded
2. To encourage men and women to be responsible
3. To encourage cardiovascular health through walking and biking

Work Transportation:

1. \$10 per week when carpooling to and from work within the city
2. \$15 per week to and from work when carpooling is not available
3. Outside of the city, the fee for the trip will be negotiated ahead of time with the driver

Personal Trips:

1. \$5 flat fee within the city, round trip
2. 40¢ per mile outside the city

No-Cost Transportation:

1. All Omega functions, meetings, church, and Bible study
2. Two scheduled community shopping trips per house per week
3. The first two weeks of employment to & from work in the city

General Rules:

- All fees are due in advance unless arrangements for post-ride payments are approved or transportation will be denied.
- Seat belts are required at all times.
- Loud music is prohibited.
- Hand gesturing and yelling obscenities from any vehicle are prohibited.
- Management discourages the consumption of food or drink in the vehicle.
- All trash is to be removed at the end of the ride.
- Smoking in vehicles is prohibited.
- Unless specific permission is given by leadership, men and women riding together must have a third person in the vehicle.

Any violation of any of the above could result in the loss of driving and/or riding privileges.

Live Free Ministries reserves the right to make exceptions to the policy when necessary.

I give the program permission to examine and open all mail sent to the office and for mail sent to the house to be examined by the house leader and house supervisor.

I also give full permission to the Omega Project to monitor any behaviors, including the taking of prescribed medicine, as a condition of my remaining as a participant in the house.

I have read and understand the program guidelines. If there is a point at which I am no longer willing to be held to these expectations, I will either submit to corrective procedures up to and including removal, or voluntarily withdraw from the program.
